Commandant's Letter ~ November, 2022

Greeting Marines, Associate members, Navy FMF Corpsmen and Chaplains:

Happy 247th USMC Birthday to all Marines. Thank you for your service and for your continued commitment and dedication to the Marine Corps League. The Marine Corps has never been beaten in battle. The Fourth Marine Regiment was forced to surrender in the Philippine Islands during World War II because they were ordered to give up by General Wainwright. The Japanese forces continued to kill our wounded along with countless women and children and were going to continue until all troops surrendered. Numerous Marines went into the hills and became attached to the Philippine resistance and worked behind the lines disrupting Japanese supply routes and communications. There were over 50,000 patriots and guerrilla forces waiting for General MacArthur when he returned to the Philippines.

From the time our nation created our military forces, family members have seen their loved ones depart for deployments or into combat zones. These families face this ordeal while waiting for their loved ones to return.

They hope and pray daily they are not killed or wounded, and this slowly develops into tremendous amounts of stress and anxiety. They had to make adjustments, always watching the daily news, and reading newspapers about battles their loved ones may have been in. They wrote letters and anxiously waited for letters from their loved ones. When they do not receive any letters for weeks, this compounded their fear as they wait and watch for the mailman. The most important thing family members could have done was take care of themselves. Families must be commended for their personal commitment and support they have given all our veterans during deployments and while their loved ones served in uniform.

Marines are usually ordinary young people performing remarkable acts of bravery and selfless acts of devotion to a higher cause bigger than themselves. They could have done something more self-serving but chose to serve knowing full well they could go in harm's way. The dedication and commitment of those who serve is unparalleled. They are heroes every day because they stand ready to go across the globe to defend our freedom and way of life. For those who never serve in the military, they should be obliged to all veterans because they came forward at the call of their country and served in your place. Their courage, honor and commitment was displayed every day as they served their country. Their sacrifice will never be forgotten.

In our travels we learned that life isn't very easy for most people in this world. And that we are blessed, to have won life's lottery, and to have been born in this country. Serving in the military taught us about physical courage, teamwork, the absolute virtue of a human being's great adventure and that all men fall. Committing yourself to serve in the military, makes you appreciate your own mortality and you realize the best quality of life is just getting home alive. Finally, our time in the service did more for us than we could have ever done for it, it gave us an extraordinary adventure to live that is ours, and that we will never for the rest of our life forget. It's your life, live it!

MAJOR GENERAL JOHN A. LEJEUNE'S BIRTHDAY MESSAGE

On November 1st, 1921, John A. Lejeune, 13th Commandant of the Marine Corps, directed that a reminder of the honorable service of the Corps be published by every command, to all Marines throughout the globe, on the Birthday of the Corps. Since that day, Marines have continued to distinguish themselves on many battlefields and foreign shores, in war and peace. On this Birthday of the Corps, therefore, in compliance with the will of the 13th Commandant, Article 38, United States Marine Corps Manual, Edition of 1921, is published as follows:

"(1) On November 10, 1775, a Corps of Marines was created by a resolution of the Continental Congress. Since that date many thousands of men have borne that name Marine. In memory of them it is fitting that we who are Marines should commemorate the Birthday of our Corps by calling to mind the glories of its long and illustrious history.

(2) The record of our Corps is one which bears comparison with that of the most famous military organizations in the world's history. During 90 of the 146 years of its existence the Marine Corps has been in action against the Nation's foes. From the Battle of Trenton to the Argonne, Marines have won foremost honors in war and in the long eras of tranquility at home, generation after generation of Marines have grown gray in war in both hemispheres, and in every corner of the seven seas so that our country and its citizens might enjoy peace and security.

(3) In every battle and skirmish since the Birth of the Corps, Marines have acquitted themselves with the greatest distinction, winning new honors on each occasion until the term "Marine" has come to signify all that is highest in military efficiency and soldierly virtue.

(4) This high name of distinction and soldierly repute we who are Marines today have received from those who preceded us in the Corps. With it we also received from them the eternal spirit which has animated our Corps from generation and has long been the distinguishing mark of Marines in every age. So long as that spirit continues to flourish Marines will be found equal to every emergency in the future as they have been in the past, and the men of our nation will regard us as worthy successors to the long line of illustrious men who have served as "Soldiers of the Sea" since the founding of the Corps."



Professional Development Training Membership Recruiting

Always be on the lookout for indications of whether someone is a Marine veteran or not. Look for bumper stickers or license plates in a parking lot. Are they wearing any veteran appeal as this is a way to determine if they are a Marine veteran. If so, start a brief conversation, introduce yourself, and ask if you can call the person another time when it is most convenient for them. Tell them you would like the opportunity to tell them a little more about the Marine Corps League. It may not always go smoothly, but if you don't put yourself out there, you'll never know. You must quit being afraid of being told no. Always remember to be respectful of the potential member's time. Keep the introductory conversations to a few minutes. There's nothing worse than being pushy because that's when you lose a potential member. But make sure to actually follow up in a timely manner. If you say you are going to call or visit in a few days, be sure to do it.

Here are a few pointers you might be aware of: Be sure to maintain a neat, professional appearance; shake hands; use everyday words when speaking; don't use profanity; Always say thank you; Acknowledge and talk to other individuals who might be with the veteran; put away all vices, such as tobacco products or cell phones; Address potential members as "sir" or "ma'am". Whether you are working a membership booth in a mall or festival or approaching someone in the grocery store parking lot, remember these 4 basic steps:

Introduction: Introduce yourself and make it clear you are with the Marine Corps League because not everyone will know what the MCL stands for.

Qualification Questions: Use specific questions to determine if the veteran is qualified to join the MCL.

Show them MCL facts: Offer brochures and present facts about the MCL to illustrate what the organization does and why it is important for them to join.

Ask them to join: If you never ask them to join, they never will.

The survivability of the MCL is reliant on good recruiting practices. Being courteous and respectful goes a long way in recruiting. Don't get discouraged and never give up.

Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC)

The **Dependency and Indemnity Compensation** (DIC) benefit paid by the **Department of Veterans Affairs** to survivors of certain deceased veterans will be increasing by 8.7% for 2023.

What Is DIC?

DIC is a monthly benefit paid to eligible survivors of certain deceased veterans. There are two main types, one for **surviving spouses** and **one for surviving parents**.

The surviving spouse DIC is a Congressionally mandated monthly benefit which is adjusted annually based on the Cost-of-Living.

Under most circumstances, a surviving spouse under 57 years old who remarries cannot receive DIC. Spouses, however, are eligible for increased benefits if they have children under 18, or if they have a disability themselves that requires living assistance.

Parent DIC is based on the parent's income. Typically, only those parents whose income is below a certain level are eligible.

How Much Is DIC?

The basic monthly tax-free DIC benefit will increase from \$1,457.66 for 2022 to \$1,584.48 for 2023, with additional amounts also seeing the 8.7% increase.

Phaseout of Widows Tax

In 2023, affected surviving spouses who receive DIC and [Survivor Benefit Plan \(SBP\)](#) payments from the deceased veteran's military service will no longer see their SBP payments decreased by the monthly DIC amount. This is due to the [phaseout of the so called "widows tax"](#) that becomes complete in the upcoming year.

Benefits Delivery

If you or a beneficiary were not able to receive a benefit payment after a hurricane, call the VA National Call Center at **1-800-827-1000**. Call center representatives can guide you on how to request a one-time special payment.

VA Home Loans

If you need help making a mortgage payment, VA can:

- Ask lenders to put a 90-day freeze on foreclosure.
- Encourage lenders to waive late charges.
- Work with your mortgage lender to apply prepayments already made to your upcoming payment.

GI Bill

If your school is temporarily closed due to a hurricane, VA will continue payments through the end of the term or for up to four weeks (28 calendar days) from the date of school closure, whichever is earlier. Learn more about the GI Bill [here](#).

If you are displaced due to a hurricane and receive employment services from VA, you may qualify for two additional months of Employee Adjustment Allowance (EAA). Learn more about VR&E [here](#).

Mail Contingency

If hurricane-related mail service disruptions impact the timeliness of VA receiving important claims paperwork or information from you, know that VA accounts for these disaster-related impacts and will not penalize you for subsequent mail delays. It's More Than Adventure It's about Family

When I first joined the MCL I was welcomed into a wonderful culture and family I never knew I had. And it felt great. That's how I feel about the League. Until I received help with my VA claim and attended my first detachment meeting in 2002. I didn't know anything about the organization. But I quickly discovered it's a welcoming family of fellow Marines. We're all from different backgrounds, branches, and eras, but we're bound together by a common thread.

As we all know, keeping a family together requires everyone's effort. I certainly didn't join the League to be just a member. I came to offer help. Because before I was even a member, The League was there for me as I began facing the issues haunting me from my time at An Hao in Vietnam leading up to the Tet offensive in 1968. It's an honor to give back to the organization that has done so much for me. I have a diverse background. I was a FMF corpsman with 1st Marine Division in I Corps in Vietnam and was an aircrew and flight corpsman on Huey gunships in the Mekong Delta, Vietnam with HAL (3) Sea wolves. I served with Cargo Handling Group One at Williamsburg, VA and was a flight corpsman with VRF-31 at NAS Norfolk, Va. I attended advance Independent Duty School in Portsmouth VA and served aboard the following Navy ships: USS El Paso LKA -117, USS Neosho AO -143, USS Mississippi AO-144, USS Boulder LST-1190, I served with the Fourth Marine Air Wing at Aurora, CO and returned to Naval Amphibious Base Little Creek Virginia as a Senior Chief Corpsman aboard USS Pensacola LSD - 38. Upon advancement to Master Chief Corpsman I was assigned to Physician Assistant School at Portsmouth, VA and commissioned as CWO 2 upon graduation. I was stationed at NAS Pensacola, FL and then to Marine Corps Combat Development Command at Quantico, VA. I was assigned to Officer Candidates School at Brown Field and Camp Upshur for seven years. My next assignment was aboard USS Theodore Roosevelt CVN -71 for forward deployment to the Persian Gulf and Desert Storm. Finished up back at Quantico Marine Base at The Basic School for five years and retired as CWO4 with 32 years active duty.

These experiences have given me countless stories to share, some true, but more importantly, they're provided me with the ability to relate to lots of different people. It's been a joy to connect with others and point them to the League and the activities and events we do. The work I have done with VA claims helps so many receive benefits they deserve which helps them and their family.

Through that work, our League has a renewed energy. We're reconnecting with our roots of proactive volunteer service. To me there's no better feeling than helping fellow marines and their families. When we nurture this feeling, more Marines will know how much we care about them.

The military events and theme activities we do in our areas is also attractive to younger Marines and others in the various military community, many of whom are looking to join an organization that's focused on service and activities. We should all be proud of how we provide assistance to distressed Marines and their families the ability to live with respect and dignity.

Killed in the bombing were 220 Marines, 17 Navy medical personnel and four Army soldiers in the largest single-day loss of U.S. Marines since the battle of Iwo Jima in February 1945.
